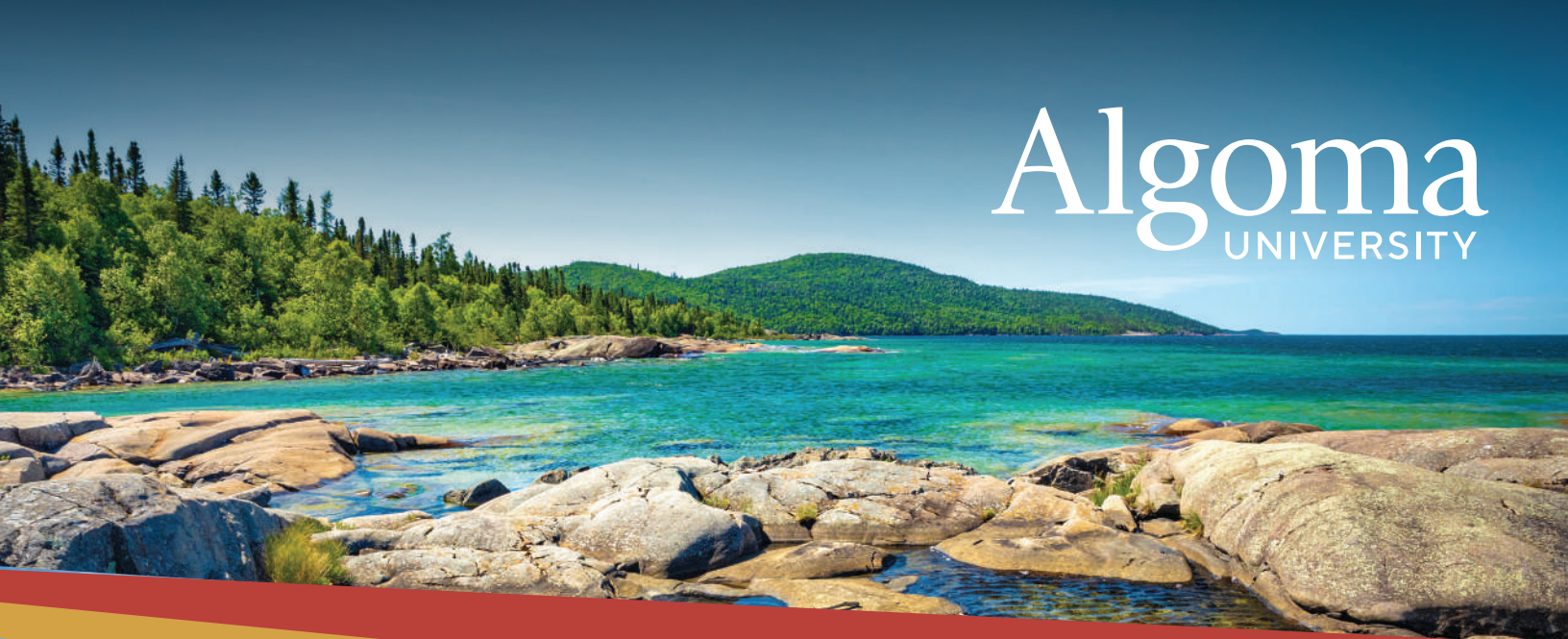

Canada

- Canada is the second largest country in the world by land area, it is just slightly smaller by land mass than the entire continent of Europe.
- Canada boasts diverse landscapes, including vast forests, towering Rocky Mountains, beautiful lakes (including the iconic Great Lakes), and extensive coastlines along the Atlantic, Pacific, and Arctic oceans.
- Canada is often regarded as a country with a high quality of life and overall satisfaction among its citizens. It consistently ranks well in various global indices that measure happiness, life satisfaction, and overall well-being.
- Canada has a rich Indigenous history and culture, with over 600 recognized Indigenous First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities. These Indigenous Peoples have lived on the land for thousands of years and have unique languages, traditions, and art forms that contribute to the diverse tapestry of Canadian identity.

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Sault Ste. Marie (Pronounced “Soo Saint Ma-ree.”):

- Known by the locals as ‘The Soo’.
- We are located at the heart of the Great Lakes, connecting both Lake Huron and beautiful Lake Superior. Lake Superior is the largest freshwater lake in the world.
- Sault Ste. Marie is unique as it is divided by an international border. The city’s Canadian side is located in the province of Ontario, while the American side, also known as Sault Ste. Marie, is situated in the state of Michigan, USA. The two cities are connected by the International Bridge.
- The Agawa Canyon Tour Train is a scenic railway journey that takes visitors through the rugged landscapes of the Canadian Shield and the picturesque Agawa Canyon. The train ride offers breathtaking views of waterfalls, forests, and pristine wilderness. Thousands of visitors from around the world come to Sault Ste. Marie each Autumn to ride the tour train.
- Sault Ste. Marie hosts various art festivals, live performances, and cultural events throughout the year. Each February, Sault Ste. Marie hosts its famous winter carnival, Bon Soo.
- Sault Ste. Marie is an outdoor enthusiast’s haven! From hiking, mountain biking, fishing, cross-country skiing, downhill skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing and more — you’ll always find something to do.

Algoma University is on a three semester system (Fall-Winter-Spring). Please note that we only accept exchange students for the Autumn and Winter semesters.

Orientation/Semester Begins: Early January
Study Week: Mid-February
Exams: Early April
Semester End: End of April

Please note that some courses require prerequisites or prior knowledge to enroll in.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

Credit Information

Algoma University follows an independent credit system. Each course is 3 AU credits with a recommended term of 15 AU Credits.

Exchange students are recommended to maintain full time study status with 12-15 AU credits per term. In reference to the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS), 15 Algoma University credits is equal to 30 ECTS.

English Language Proficiency Requirements

One of the following minimum requirements must be met in order to be eligible for admission:

- CAEL (paper-based, computer edition, or online): 60
- Cambridge English Qualifications: Overall 176, with no band below 169
- Duolingo English Test (DET): Overall 110 (including no individual band below 90)
- IELTS Academic (including IELTS Online): 6.0 overall (including no individual band below 6.0)
- TOEFL: 550 (paper-based) or 79 (Computer or Home Edition)
- TOEFL applicants are required to submit their official result on the ETS Portal. The Algoma University institution code is 0820.
- Pearson Test of English (PTE Academic & PTE Academic Online): 60

Grading

The grading scale for all individual courses is as follows:

80-100% (A) – Excellent Performance: comprehensive knowledge in depth of the principles and materials treated in the course, fluency in communicating that knowledge and originality and independence in applying material and principles.

70-79% (B) – Good Performance: thorough understanding of the breadth of materials and principles treated in the course and ability to apply and communicate that understanding effectively.

60-69% (C) – Satisfactory Performance: basic understanding of the breadth of principles and material treated in the course and an ability to apply and communicate that understanding competently.

50-59% (D) – Marginal Performance: adequate understanding of most principles and material treated in the course, but significant weakness in some areas and in the ability to apply and communicate that understanding.

0-49% (F) – Failure: inadequate or fragmentary knowledge of the principles and material treated in the course, or failure to complete the work required in the course.

LIVING ON CAMPUS

On-campus accommodation is mandatory for all incoming exchange students. We offer three styles of living for our students including:

Algoma Dormitory

- Guaranteed single room, including twin bed, full wardrobe and desk
- Shared bathroom with one dorm mate of the same gender
- Common rooms with entertainment centres shared with all students
- Shared common kitchen space
- Weekly cleaning in all bathrooms and common areas
- Laundry facilities available
- 24/7 on-campus security
- Required meal plan

Spirit Village Townhouses

- Townhouse with five bedrooms (each room includes twin bed, full wardrobe, and desk)

- Meal plan optional but not required

- Required meal plan

MANDATORY HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN FOR INCOMING EXCHANGE STUDENTS

The University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP)

UHIP provides insurance to cover the cost of hospital and medical services that students or employees and their families might need to maintain their health while studying and working at an Ontario university in Canada.

UHIP is a basic and primary health plan that covers the following services:

- Hospital services such as emergency room services, non-emergency hospitalization, etc.;
- Physician services (for example: annual health examination, diagnosis or treatment of illness and injuries, care related to pregnancy, etc.); and
- Routine eye examinations for persons under 20 years of age.

Health Insurance (UHIP)* – \$252 per semester
